The Derby Riverboat

As previously reported the Riverboat is now operating and as planned we have managed to get power connected up in mid month. It is a great relief not to be reliant on the sun. The trek to the open bank,

chosen for it's inaccessibility by vandals, but involving a treacherous clamber across a wall, through brambles and down a steep bank is no more. Neither is the worry that the chains have been severed and the boat set loose. Although we have suffered "visitations" captured on our camera security and who have been frightened off by our alarm system. The Council are supposed to be adding further protection to the gate design, but it can't come quickly enough. Pity they didn't design it right first time round of course.

Planning permission for the Phase 2 pontoon is expected to go to a planning committee meeting in November, but we have Council assurances it will be in place for the start of our activity next year. We have continued to have excellent relations with the Rowing Clubs and have offered to promote their clubs on the boat.

We've continued working to keep on top of the various sections under our active management.









